Crop reports show the potato yield in the vicinity of Ellipticville is far better than ever before.

The grape crop in the Chautauqua belt is reported to be about two weeks late this year in maturity.

Telegraphers on the Western New York and Pennsylvania division of the Pennsylvania are on strike.

Indian delegates from the Six Nations will hold a convention on the Tuscarora reservation on Oct. 2.

Milk dealers near Ellipticville are trying to deal directly with producers and ignore the Dairyman's league.

The Cattaraugus Times states the apple crop in the district in which it circulates is an absolute failure.

North Tonawanda is considering attachment of soft coal as a means of keeping the municipal fires going.

Palmira's streets are dark these nights because the light company has failed to put in a new transformer.

Tonawanda has a deal pending which involves the removal of a \$2,000,000 war-order corporation to that city.

Unless the company which makes it gets coal very soon gas will be boosted in Rochester 10 cents per 1,000.

Fred Zweifeld and his son of Waterville made the first sale of hops at \$1 a pound. This is the first price of \$1 since 1882.

The Rutland railroad made the announcement in Syracuse that vacancies will be filled by women if they can qualify.

Mayor Edgerton of Rochester has put his foot down on all attempts to hold meetings of a seditious character in that city.

Henry Warren, stone blind, has just finished painting the exterior of his home in Randolph. Residents state the job done is first class.

Miss Elizabeth Abbuti, a graduate of the home economics department of Cornell, has been appointed food conservation agent for Orleans county.

Enemies of Governor Whitman's program for food control won a point by forcing an agreement for an adjournment of the legislature for one week.

Unless farmers renew their contracts with the Dairyman's league, which supplies New York city, there will be a milk famine there after October.

A. S. Davis, president of the Seneca Falls Manufacturing company, has announced an increase in the firm's capitalization from \$500,000 to \$600,000.

Captains of the four home defense companies in North Tonawanda have been asked to determine at once how many of their men will go into the state guard.

Two carloads of domestic cabbage have been shipped from Batavia and the price paid was \$10 a ton. This is the first to be shipped from this county this fall.

Because of a disagreement over moving at the White House, Mrs. George W. Knox has resigned as the chairman of the Niagara county suffrage organization.

Organization of the New York Food Distributors' association, for the purpose of aiding in the solution of troublesome food problems, was announced in New York.

Mayor supplied its first recruits to the mounted corps of the United States army when Louis Binart, a student of recognized ability, was selected for the engineers corps.

A petition was presented in Buffalo against the \$3,000,000 damages to be paid for the bridge canal project.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Livingston County Growers' association, Inc., at Avon, these officers were elected: President, H. A. McVean of Caledonia; vice president, Walter E. Loudon of Lima; secretary, James E. Crouse of Avon; treasurer, Frank Kellogg of Avon.

Samuel E. Monroe, one of the oldest civil engineers in Southern New York and well known in engineering circles in the state, died at his home in Binghamton. He had charge of the construction of the DeWane & Hudson railroad tunnel at Sanitaria Springs, which half a century ago was considered a marvel in railroad engineering.

Albert L. Brockway, representing the Holstein Priesen Breeders' association, declared in Syracuse on his return from a conference with Food Administrator Hoover, that meatless days will be started in the United States in a month's time.

Warsaw more than raised its share, \$260, for the war library fund and a check for the amount has been forwarded to headquarters. The amount over the \$250 will be saved for any future subscription that may be needed for library purposes.

Complaint from Adjutant General Sherrill, over the failure of Erie county home defense men to enter the New York state guard is causing a lively squabble in which Clerk Hinkley of the supervisors, Representative Smith and others are engaged.

Miss Hesel Hansen has been elected supervisor of physical training for the towns of Barrington and Starkey and for districts No. 2, 4, 7, 8, 11 and 13 in the town of Milo. Miss Hansen will direct the work of physical training in these schools and give talk on hygiene.

Major Lewis Babcock of Buffalo has been appointed by Governor Whitman as brigadier general of the Third brigade, New York Guard. Announcement of the appointment was made by Adjutant General Sherrill. The New York guard supplants the National Guard, which is in federal service.

The Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and Animals closed its sessions in Binghamton with the election of president, Knowledge Mixer, Buffalo; secretary, Charles H. Warner, Yonkers; treasurer, Thomas Hale, Jr. Yonkers. Buffalo was selected as the city in which the next convention will be held.

A new schedule of milk prices to retail dealers was announced in Buffalo by the Dairyman's league. The new schedule calls for a price of 28 1/2 cents per gallon for October and 30 1/2 cents per gallon for November. Retail dealers say the action of the league presages an increase in the cost to the consumer of one cent per quart.

Niagara county is doing its bit to help feed the British army and is contributing a large part of the vegetables for soup on the Tommies' bill of fare. The onions, celery and carrots are grown and dried on the Jackson farm near Middleport and are shipped to Canada where they are packed in cans and then transported to England.

George D. Osgwell of Attica and Everett M. Judd of Batavia, former city attorneys, are responsible for starting the petitions in Genesee and Wyoming counties addressed to United States senators Wadsworth and Calder demanding the impeachment of Senator La Follette. The petitions have approximately 1,000 signers in both counties.

The milk prices of the Corfu Dairyman's league for October and November are \$2.94 and \$3.18 a can for three per cent milk, four per cent being added for each one-tenth increase of butter fat. Can shippers to Buffalo will receive 2 1/2 and 3 1/2 cents a gallon for October and November, respectively, one per cent to be deducted from the can price.
