... We want to grow big enough  
... to give a rouge to the unknown  
... and adventure with a hunter's  
... seal the lanes of the unseen.  
... There is only this to dread —  
... that the souls that prefer dark-  
... may find it waiting on the  
... other side — and become lost in it.  
... Reason says there must be  
... life or extinction. There is the  
... possibility that souls may die.  
... It is certain that no life-hungry  
... soul shall fail to find.  
... There is no light to light the  
... outward way except Faith's. But  
... Faith's enough. The power that  
... outshines the world's darkness,  
... rises over trouble and calamity,  
... comes unbidden through disaster,  
... is big enough to dare the ad-  
... venture outward when soul closes  
... the gate and strikes out across

The best argument for God's  
existence is the existence of hu-  
man beings. We find ourselves  
with burning imagination that af-  
ter finding nothing in the world  
big enough to build upon builds a  
city beyond here and fills it with  
what ought to be — streets, folks,  
workshops, fields, homes — and  
God.  
This imagination is valid.  
Every subjective has objective  
reality somewhere.  
To believe in God is the normal  
exercise of a spiritual quality.  
Not to believe in God is evi-  
dence that either the Soul  
Has not awakened —  
Has strangled its interests — or  
Has bartered its capacities for  
lesser objects.  
The normal soul believes in  
God as instinctively as normal  
people speak comrades.  
Eye for seeing, ear for hearing.  
Organization rises out of Life. Th  
soul must have its true objective,  
its glorified use. That is sweep-  
ing the universe in search of  
Some One worth this all-love. And  
God is hard by, very close to the  
hunter.

A believing soul certifies its  
life. Seek in vain in people in  
whom faith in God is not and  
every sign speaks of death and  
darkness.  
The atheist is excluded from  
human society. He has no guar-  
anty of honor. His pledges, treat-  
ies, affirmations cannot be be-  
lieved.  
The pledge-breakers, promise-  
repudiators, truce-traitors, work  
the abomination and the lie. They  
repudiate God.  
A traitor is outlaw in a universe  
whose seal is Honor.  
No person whose vision is  
flamed by Honor will repudiate  
his promise.  
Everything is forgivable except  
treason.  
That is the "unforgivable sin"

The most dread place in the

Conscience sits. Surrounding the

gates obscuring the trails. Terri-  
bly to be feared is a life that  
has chosen evil as a god.  
Terribly to be feared is he who  
thrones brute power and ar-  
rogant tyranny and blasphemous

the residue" makes a god.  
He is a living soul who believes  
in God and the world may know  
he believes in God by the dem-  
onstration of honor in all rela-  
tions.

Unable to cope with the multipli-  
city of federal and state taxes and the  
increased cost of all luxurians, 1-  
000 saloons and retail liquor stores  
in Greater New York have closed  
their doors, according to estimates  
made by excise officials. When the  
license fee of \$1,500, which must be  
paid in advance, became due hun-  
dreds of places failed to open their  
doors.

### QUESTIONS SUBMITTED

Board of Elections, County of  
Steuben, office of the Com-  
missioners.

To the Electors of the Town of  
Greenwood, in the County of  
Steuben, N. Y.

Notice is hereby given that a  
petition under Section 13 of the  
Liquor Tax Law has been timely  
filed with the Board of Elections,  
of the County of Steuben, for the  
submission to said Electors, of  
the questions under said Law and  
said Section. Now, therefore take  
notice that in order to ascertain  
the will of the qualified electors  
that at the General Election to  
be held in said Town of Green-  
wood, on Tuesday, the 6th day  
of November, 1917, the following  
propositions or questions will be  
submitted to the qualified electors  
of the Town of Greenwood, in  
said county, to be determined by  
ballot, viz:

Question 1. Selling liquor to  
be drunk on the premises where  
sold. Shall any person be author-  
ized to traffic in liquors under the  
provisions of subdivision one of  
section eight of the Liquor tax

law, namely, by selling liquor to  
be drunk on the premises where  
sold, in the Town of Greenwood.

Question 2. Selling liquor not to  
be drunk on premises where sold.  
Shall any person be authorized to  
traffic in liquors under the pro-  
visions of subdivision two of sec-  
tion eight of the liquor tax law,  
namely, by selling liquor not to  
be drunk on the premises where  
sold, in the Town of Greenwood.

Question 3. Selling liquor as a  
pharmacist on a physician's pre-  
scription. Shall any person be  
authorized to traffic in liquors  
under the provisions of subdivi-  
sion three of section eight of the  
liquor tax law, namely, by selling  
liquor as a pharmacist on a physi-  
cian's prescription, in the Town  
of Greenwood.

Question 4. Selling liquor by  
hotel keepers only. Shall any  
person be authorized to traffic  
in liquors under subdivision one  
of section eight of the liquor tax  
law, but only in connection with  
the business of keeping a hotel,  
in the Town of Greenwood if the  
majority of the votes cast on the  
first question submitted are in  
the negative?
