WILL IT COME TO THIS AGAIN?

D. P. Corwin, one of Andover's most respected citizens, sends the News the following:
Mr. Editor:

Reading the News this morning set me thinking about what happened about forty years ago. A man by the name of Davis fixed up the corner hotel and called it the "Imperial." He sold what he called whiskey and my head man drank \$15 worth of it. He refused to pay him for it because it was poor stuff.

WIDOWS PENSIONS INCREASED

The Widows of veterans have been granted a substantial increase in pensions. They will receive at least \$25 a month. Those now receiving pensions will not be obliged to put in any claim for the increase.

The official announcement of the pension bureau is as follows: "Payment of increases in pensions of widows of men who fought in the Civil war, Spanish war and Philippine insurrection, provided by an amendment to the pension law attached to the soldiers' and sailors' insurance bill, will begin with the disbursements Nov. 4. The pensions were raised to \$25 a month, the increase ranging from \$5 to \$13 a month."

RED CROSS BENEFIT

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The medical inspection and hygiene of school children is being made this week in the Andover schools by Medical Inspector Dr. W. J. Grenolds and School Nurse Miss Hazel Stewart. They are asking the hearty cooperation of the parents and public at large in their work.
