 When the peach leaves are off spray for scale and for peach-leaf curl. A sprayed orchard is a healthy orchard.

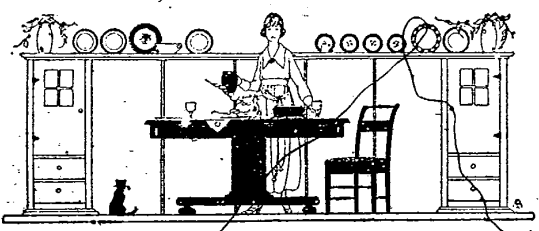
