### RED CROSS WORK

A third shipment of Red Cross sewing was made the first of the week; the list is as follows:

Seventeen Turkish towels, twenty bed shirts, eighteen fracture pads, nine comfort pillows, six small feather pillows and cases, thirty water bottle covers, twelve surgeon's caps, twelve operating helmets, twenty-four tray covers, twenty-four table napkins, twenty-four bed socks, six operating leggings, twelve abdominal binders, twenty-four triangular armslings, fifty-seven hand towels, thirty-eight operating towels, twenty linen huck towels, seventy-two wash cloths, eighty-four substitutes for handkerchiefs, twelve hemmed handkerchiefs.

### WATCH OUT FOR FAKERS

Fake government agents have been visiting the homes of persons in several sections of the county, stating there was a tax of five cents per can on canned goods above one dozen, and unless the people paid the tax the agents must take the surplus. They also tell the housewives that they must not have over fifty pounds of granulated sugar in their homes, and if they have, a tax of ten per cent, per pound on the amount over fifty pounds must be paid. Authorities request that housewives notify them on the appearance of any of those so called agents.
