### TWO VISIONS OF DUTY

When so many of our young men are going into soldiers' train camps and across the ocean to take their part in the great war, some mothers may be at the point of view expressed by the poet, Edwin Markham:

Mothers, will you longer give your sons  
To feed the awful hunger of the guns?  
What is the worth of all these battle drums  
If from the field the loved one never comes?  
What all these loud hosannas to the brave  
If all your share is some forgotten grave?"

The following reply to Edwin Markham was written by Bishop James D. Hughes of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Pasadena, Cal. It breathes the spirit of fine patriotism and is particularly significant because Bishop Hughes' own son was killed in action some time ago in France and is buried somewhere in that country. These are the sentiments expressed by Bishop Hughes in his reply, which is entitled:

### The Unselfish Mother's Answer

"God gave my son in trust to me; Christ died for him, and he should be  
A man for Christ. He is his own, And God's and man's; not mine alone.  
He is not mine to give. He gave Himself that he might help to save  
All that a Christian should revere All that enlightened men hold dear.  
To feed the guns! Oh, torpid soul!  
Awake and see life as a whole. When freedom, honor, justice, right,  
Were threatened by the despot's might,  
With heart aflame and soul a-sight,  
He bravely went for God to fight Against base savages whose pride  
The laws of God and man defied; Who maidens pure and sweet de- filed;  
He did not go to feed the guns, He went to save from ruthless Hun  
His home and country, and to be guardian of Democracy.  
What if he does not come?" you say;  
Ah, well! my sky would be more gray,  
But thru the clouds the sun would shine  
And vital memories be mine, God's test of manhood is, I know,  
Not "will he come?" but "Did he go!"  
My son well knew that he might die,  
And yet he went, with purpose high,  
To fight for peace, and overthrow The plans of Christ's relentless foe.  
He dreamed not the battlefield; He went to make fierce vendals wild,  
To come not again to me To feed the guns, but not that he  
Like a man—a hero true— Would bravely go to do.  
With feet exultant pride Humanity he died.  
Mothers! This selfish  
... ..

For though his grave I may not see,  
My boy will ne'er forgotten be,  
My real son can never die;  
'Tis but his body that may lie  
In foreign land, and I shall keep  
Remembrance fond forever deep  
Within my heart for my true son  
Because of triumphs that he won,  
It matters not where anyone  
May lie and sleep when work is done,  
It matters not where some men  
Live,  
If my dear son his life must give,  
Hosannas I will sing for him,  
E'en though my eyes with tears  
Be dim.  
And when the war is over, when  
His gallant comrades come again  
I'll cheer them as they're march- ing by.  
Rejoicing that they did not die.  
And when his vacant place I see,  
My heart will bound with joy  
That he  
Was mine so long—my fair young son—  
And cheer for him whose work is done."

### SMALL PACKAGES OF FLOUR BULED AGAINST

After the First of the Year Noth- ing But Large Packages May be Delivered

After the first of the year little Johnny won't be sent to the corner grocery store for a package of flour, for there will be no packages of flour which Johnny can carry.

Local millers and wholesalers of flour recently received orders from the milling division of the national food administration that on and after December 1st flour must not be sold in less than one-eighth barrel lots, and that no deliveries in less than that amount may be made after January 1st next on contracts now existing.

This applies to all millers, blenders of flour, packers, whole salers and jobbers who will be allowed after December 1st to market only one-eighth, one-quarter, one-half and whole barrels of flour. It will apply to all wheat products except graham flour, entire wheat flour, wheat cereals, table bran and gluten flour. Local millers, however, do not construe this regulation to include buckwheat and other sorts of pancake flours which are nearly always put up in small packages. These may be packed as usual under license of the food administration. Small sacks of pastry flour and ordinary flour come under the law and will not be packed after December 1st.

It is stated by a local dealer that the law will be little noticed in this city, where flour is generally sold in the larger packages but that in the larger cities where the product is sold in five and two pound and one-half pound packages the law will have a wide effect. It is these small packages at which the regulation is directed. According to this dealer they are expensive, the cost of packing and handling them and the excess profit which the retailer demands upon them brings the price of the product when handled in this way to an unwarranted point.

TO OWNERS OF PLEASURE BOATS  
The War Revenue Act provides for a tax on all yachts, pleasure boats, power boats and sailing boats of over five net tons, and motor boats with fixed engines not used exclusively for trade or national defense.  
All persons or corporations using or owning such vessels or boats are urged to write their office immediately, giving their name and address, the number of vessels so used or owned, and the net tonnage and over-length of each. Upon the receipt of such information proper forms for making return and paying taxes will be mailed to each such person or corporation. The return must be filed and the taxes paid this month.

HOW TEACHERS MAY HELP  
Teachers in the public schools of a certain city in this country have set a precedent that should be followed generally. They have unanimously agreed to contribute their services for one month of the present term free, in order to lengthen the term.
