The chamber of commerce of Canisteo were on the ground and are taking a deep interest in the matter. There were several from Oswego, Rexville, and other localities present. N. E. Coston was made chairman of the meeting and speeches were made by G. M. Beaser, Hon. J. L. Seely, David Travis, J. L. Latham, W. W. Crittendon and others. The general opinion of those present as to the best course to pursue was to sell stock to the amount of \$150,000.00 in a new corporation to be formed and then issue bonds to the amount of \$250,000 which it is believed would pay for the road, run it in repair and provide a fund for operating expenses. People along the line are beginning to see the importance of the road to the country thru which it passes and the villages on the line and they also realize that it would be worth indirectly more than its cost to those interested and its loss to the community would be a great calamity and that if it goes there would be another in its wake.
