NURSES MUST REGISTER

of all Classes Expected to be Out Cards as From Clerk's Office Before December 10th.
The General Medical Board of the Council of National Districts have authorized a complete enumeration of the nurses of New York State and have requested the New York State Nurses Association to make such census. The enumeration is compulsory for all classes in Albany County must register with the town clerk in each town by the 10th day of December. The registration includes nurses as follows:
Graduate Nurses, registered.
Graduate Nurses, not registered.

acted, or under graduation.
The Board of Health, meaning all the nurses taken a Red Cross course in elementary hygiene of care of the sick, first aid, or preparation of supplies.

The purpose of the survey is to find out how many persons are engaged in different classes of nursing service as in the broader divisions of nursing specialties, in order to facilitate the organization of emergency services both abroad and at home.

Registration cards for the different classes will be found at the clerk's office in each town. All persons coming under the provisions noted above are to have such card before Dec. 10, which day they are to send to Miss Mauss, at Wellsville, who is secretary for Albany County.

The co-operation of the nurses in spreading this information of the town clerk and the registration card to the persons coming under the provisions of nurse work noted, is most requested, that this may be completed promptly and correctly.
