SEED SURVEY

The necessity of keeping all good seed and grain for planting in the spring was never greater than at this time. Farmers are urged to hold all seed that has matured properly and is true and free from varietal mixtures. Due to the late seasons and early frosts, much grain that would ordinarily be used for seed purposes, will be too weak in vitality and have a low percentage of germination.

In order to save all good seed, a country-wide survey will be made at once. Farmers are requested to return their blanks promptly, stating definitely the amounts of seed that they will have for sale that is suitable for seed purposes, and the amount that they will need to purchase. A market will be found for all first-class seed, as the demand is certain to be much greater than the supply. Send in your amount and keep all good seed, rather than to feed it or sell it on the market.
