ALLEGANY COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Organization of Society is Made Here. Large Membership is Anticipated. Work will be Pushed.

Genesee Country Historical Society organized in June, 1917, embracing the entire western part of New York State from Lake to the Niagara River. The plan is to begin active work in Allegany County. The plan is to organize a historical society in the county, which will be at all the federal fairs. Further it will work with the New York Historical Society. The plan indicates, in state and county, in complete harmony with the historical societies organized.
