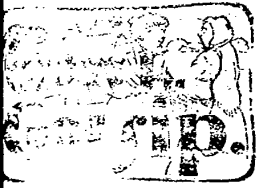

### PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION APPOINTMENT TO ANNAPOLIS AND WEST POINT

Hon. Charles M. Hamilton, Member of Congress from this District announces that a preliminary examination will be held in the Academic Study Hall, High School Building, City of Jamestown, on January 12th, 1918, between the hours of 9 and 12 A. M. and 1:30 and 4:30 p. m. The examinations will be conducted by Prof. M. J. Fletcher of the Jamestown High School, and will be open to all young men; between the ages of 16 and 20 in the case of Annapolis, and between the ages of 17 and 22 in the case of West Point; who are residents of the 43rd Congressional District of the State of New York. The young men passing the highest will be recommended to the Departments as principals, those passing second highest will be recommended as first alternates and those passing third highest will be recommended as second alternates. No candidates will be allowed to enter both examinations.
