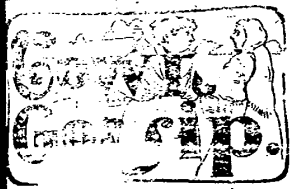

BIG PROBLEM SOLVED

Kerosene Carburetor Perfected and Offered to U. S. During War

Washington, Dec. 21.—A development of the utmost importance to the United States and the Allies in the prosecution of the war became known here thru the interior department. A carburetor which can be used with any gasoline engine and which will make it possible to use kerosene for fuel, instead of gasoline without any alterations of the engine, has been perfected and applications for a patent has been made. The patent rights will be turned over to the government free of charge, the privilege to continue thruout the war.

Van H. Manning, director of the bureau of mines, is satisfied, after investigation and trials of the device, that it will accomplish consistently all that is claimed for it.

Officials here concerned with the problems of supply for the war engines of the American military forces, as well as transportation and aviation experts, are pleased with what they declare to be the solution of one of the gravest problems they have faced. Gasoline was slated to play a highly important part in the war with production more or less limited and the end of the world's supply in sight.

C. D. McCarn Starts Tire Repair Shop

Mr. McCarn completed a course in tire repairing at the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, at Akron, Ohio, and attained the degree of Master Vulcanizer. He is installing a complete vulcanizing equipment in his shop and will be pleased to make your old tires good for you at reasonable charge.

Leo W. D'Antremont, of Hume, died Wednesday afternoon of last week at his home in that village, after several months illness. He was for several years supervisor from the Town of Hume, and was at present school superintendent of the Northern Allegany District.
