ADDITIONAL CLERKS REQUIRED

Distribution of allowance and allotment checks to dependents of enlisted men of the United States has required an extra night shift of clerks and typists in the Bureau of War Risk Insurance.

Every enlisted man in the military and naval forces of the United States who has a wife and children dependent on him is required to allot for their support at least \$75 a month, but not more than half his pay.

Commissioned officers are not required to make allotments, and the Government does not provide allowances for their dependents.

MAKING BUY BREAD IS FOUND LOTS

The Food Administration changes its rule prohibiting bakers selling less than a pound of bread to consumers, to prevent working a hardship on the poor of New York. These people, many of them foreigners, buy bread from big loaves by the penny and two-penny slice, and have not the money to buy in larger quantities.

Rolls are limited to not less than 1 ounce nor more than 3 ounces each.
