In case the permission is given the hospital will undoubtedly go to Wyoming County. They do not have to build a hospital having less than 35,000 inhabitants.

Private Wm. Spence, a returned wounded Canadian soldier, from the base hospital, London, England, accompanied by Dorra Halladay of Wellsville, was in Andover Wednesday looking the town over.

In an interview with Private Spence the News force learned many very interesting things. His home is in Harrisburg, Pa. When the war first broke out he wanted to get to the front, so went to Canada and enlisted. His trench experience is highly interesting. He was in the trenches two years and three months before he got his wound that sent him to the hospital. He was wounded in the left leg by the explosion of a shell. While the tins have left their marks on him he carries the convincing evidence that he got all of one of them. He has Fritz watch, iron gas ring, and record of one whom he shot himself. He says he will start back for the front Feb. 17th. Much of the interview with Private Spence the News would not be permitted to print. He says the news reports we get here are very meager and not at all correct.
