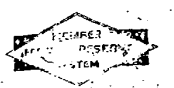

After a conference with Mayor Hykan, District Attorney Swann announced that he would begin a John Doe investigation this month, as a prelude to driving out of business all disorderly resorts in New York.

Erie county supervisors have looked over a bill which would annex Lackawanna, Tonawanda city and Grand Island and parts of the towns of Amherst, Cheektowaga, West Seneca, East Hamburg and Hamburg.

Thomas C. Stowell, secretary of the military training commission, announced at Albany that 12 field inspectors will be sent to Buffalo and Western New York in a short time to organize employed boys for military training.

That the fight of the "antis" is under way for a resubmission of the suffrage question in New York was indicated when the suffragists made public letters in which the "antis" appealed to state assemblymen to support the bill.

Ontario county farmers may now purchase nitrate of soda from the federal government on a cash basis. The Ontario County Trust company of Canandaigua has just designated as depository for advance payments which is required.

A five-day demonstration agricultural school is to be held at the Dansville High school from Feb. 4 to Feb. 8, inclusive, for the benefit of the farmers, with a special session on Wednesday evening for the nurserymen of the section.

Deputy County Fuel Administrator Robert J. Gross of Dunkirk received a telegram from State Fuel Administrator Wiggins, directing him to confiscate coal en route on railroads in order to keep the municipal water and power plant running.

Governor Whitman sent to the senate the nomination of Docta W. Law of Collins, as member of the board of managers of the Gowanda State hospital to succeed Franklin W. Bard. The appointment was referred to the finance committee.

Genesee county's first farm tractor school opened in the Y. M. C. A. assembly hall at Batavia, in charge of H. W. Riley of Ithaca, head of the farm mechanics department of the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University.

State Health Commissioner Biggs issued a warning, calling attention to the fact that the only remedy against the smallpox epidemics, which have been serious in the vicinity of Utica, and in Western New York at points adjacent to Buffalo, is vaccination.

A war fund of approximately \$132,000 will be raised by the New York state Lodge of Odd Fellows. At a special meeting of the grand lodge at Albany, attended by 500 delegates, it was voted to assess each member of the order one dollar for the war fund.

One of the largest manufacturing clothing houses in Rochester will take the production of the new jersey-cloth sweaters from the hands of the Rochester Red Cross. The work will be done in the factory for three quarters of an hour after closing time each evening.

How to meat as a substitute for beer and other meats was advocated as a means of lessening the scarcity of food by Dr. E. Horace Hodgins, dean of the New York State Veterinary College, in an address in New York at the convention of the New York State veterinarians.
