**DRAFTED BOY IS DEAD
IN CAMP DIX**

Pneumonia Fatal to E. J. Beckerman, Member of the Hornell Knights of Columbus
The first man of the national army from Hornell to lose his life while in the service of his country is Herman J. Beckerman of Wayland, who died Thursday morning at Camp Dix of pneumonia. He went with the first contingent and has been in active service ever since. Private Beckerman is about 24 years old and was a member of Hornell Council No. 243 Knights of Columbus. He was widely known here as well as in his home town and he had a host of friends in both places. The body will be brought home tomorrow morning and the funeral will be held on Thursday at Wayland. A delegation from the local council of the Knights of Columbus will attend. This district has sent 95 men to the national army and Beckerman is the first to lose his life. Many of the men are already in France and others of the first contingent are now scattered all over the country.

**METHODIST CHURCH
AT CUBA BURNS**

The Methodist Church at Cuba was burned to the ground Sunday morning, Feb. 3rd. The fire was discovered at 8:30 o'clock. The caretaker of the church left the building shortly after 8 o'clock having been there since 5 o'clock. The piano and some furnishings were saved from the Sunday School room. Two years ago the building was re-modeled and a pipe organ installed at a cost of \$18,000. The loss is placed at \$12,000 with insurance of \$4,000. The Patriot says the cause of the fire will doubtless remain a mystery.

**EVEN TAX ON DOGS
HAS BEEN RAISED**

Dog Law Begins Operation With a Vengeance March 1st Pay Your Tax or a Fine, the Rule.

Dogs to be licensed; Every person who owns, harbors or keeps a dog shall obtain a license therefor, as provided herein, and shall pay the following fees: (1) ten dollars for each male dog; (2) five dollars for each female; (3) twenty dollars for a kennel pure-bred dogs, or such sum in excess of such sum of twenty dollars as will equal two dollars for each dog over six months old harbored or kept in a kennel, for which a special license shall be given as hereafter provided. There shall be paid to the town or city clerk, in addition to each license fee, the sum of twenty-five cents as a registration fee, for the services of the clerk.
Application for a license shall be made to the clerk of the town or city in which the dog is harbored or kept. Such application shall be in writing and shall state the name, sex, breed, age, color and marking of the dog for which license is sought.
Licenses shall be applied for on or before March first in each year, and shall continue for a term of one year. Licenses shall be required for dogs under the age of four months, or under the age of six months if the owner of the breeder thereof. If such dog shall become of the age of six months, or of six months if the owner be the breeder thereof, on the first day of March, or a person shall become the owner of an unlicensed dog, or such dog, or if a license is required under existing laws prior to the taking of this act, shall expire after the date the license fee for the license of the twelve months shall be a proportionate part of the fee required for one year, and the fee twenty-five cents for the registration of such dog. Each license a dog first issued shall take effect when issued, and shall expire on the last day of February following its issuance. Each license in renewal of a license already issued shall be for a term of one year beginning on March 1st.

Issuance of licenses; penalty for failure to obtain. A license shall be issued upon application being made therefor and on payment of the fee herein before prescribed. Such license shall be in the form prescribed by the commissioner of agriculture, and shall be executed by the town or city clerk. Each license shall be for the year for which it was issued and shall bear a serial number. An owner of a dog, who refuses to obtain a license for his dog within thirty days after the date of the issuance of this chapter, shall be subject to a penalty of ten dollars to be furnished; how the city or town clerk shall issue a license shall at the same date as the license number of the dog so licensed and keep around the neck of the dog a collar of suitable material, which shall be such as to such means of rivets, metal or other suitable devices, and a dog shall not per-
