The Prohibition Party of Allegany County

in meeting assembled at Cuba in the town hall Feb. 25th, expressed general disapproval of the proposed merger with the new National Party, one speaking for the merger and nine against it. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Prohibition Party of Allegany County hereby favors the proposition to merge with the National Party only on condition that the prohibition question become the dominant issue in the new party and it does not now seem to be, and that the new party conserve the principles of a new representative government for which the Prohibition Party has stood.

Forty were present from the various parts of the county. Three delegates were elected to the Prohibition Party National Convention to be held at Chicago, Mar. 30th; namely, L. L. Brown, H. H. Hester and Miss Leona K. Hoard.
