DO YOU WANT TO SAVE YOUR DOG?

"Pay your dog tax or the state
 police will get your dog if you
 don't watch out."
 That is the message in sub-
 stance contained in the new state
 law governing the taxation of
 dogs. Under the old system dogs
 were taxed by each individual
 town and the money used to help
 pay for sheep killed. But that
 day has gone by and if sheep
 are killed now it is up to the
 state to recompense the farmer.
 Likewise the state now takes the
 responsibility of licensing the
 dogs and all license fees are now
 turned over to the state treasurer
 instead of the town.

The state is determined that
 the sheep industry will have a
 chance to thrive and that mongrel
 dogs will not have a chance of
 getting into flocks and creating
 havoc. It is the dog that runs
 wild that usually does the damage,
 and that's the dog the state
 police will be after.

Under the old law it was neces-
 sary for the town clerk to go to
 the dog owner after a certain
 length of time and collect the tax,
 but this order is now reversed.
 If the dog owner fails to pay his
 tax he is subject to a fine of \$10.
 Killing the dog does not relieve
 him from paying the fine. The
 town clerk is also subject to a
 fine of \$10 for not reporting any
 dogs he may know to be un-
 tagged, hence it may be seen
 that the state means to do busi-
 ness.
