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Food Question Box

These are some of the questions asked by our readers. They are answered by the Department of Home Economics of the State College of Agriculture at Cornell University thru the Allegany County conservation agent. Address inquiries to the Food Question Box, The Andover News, in care of County Conservation Agent, Belmont, N. Y.

1. What is the difference between sorghum and corn syrup? Sorghum is a sirup made from the sorghum or Chinese cane. In some states in the middle West, sorghum is grown extensively for the manufacture of sirup for local use. The sirup is made by crushing the cane, extracting the juice, and then evaporating it in a series of shallow pans.

Corn sirup is made from the corn, sometimes from the stalk, but more often from the kernel or starch. The starch is converted to a form of sugar by being heated with an acid. The resulting product is known commercially as glucose or corn sirup.

2. In the recipes given for war breads, compressed yeast is used. Must I get compressed yeast in order to make these breads? War breads may be made from any kind of yeast, which one is accustomed to using. If dry yeast is used, however, it should be revived and made active by mixing it with some sugar, flour and water, preferably potato water, and allowing it to stand until it becomes active, from 3 to 6 hours. If you are making three loaves of wheat-saving bread you may use the same amount of yeast as you would ordinarily use for three loaves of wheat bread. Because some of the flour substitutes are heavier than flour they may require either a longer time to rise or a little more yeast. The making of successful wheat-substitute breads is simply a matter of practice. The large amount of compressed yeast called for in the recipes was used solely for the purpose of saving time.

3. When there is not enough sugar for household purposes, why do they not close the candy factories? If all the candy factories were closed a vast army of workers would be thrown out of employment. Confectionery stores all over the country would be forced to close, and the economic conditions would be upset, as well as thousands of business men practically ruined. In order to avoid this the Food Administration has classified candies which contain a minimum of sugar and which one may eat with a clear conscience. They are:

- (1) Chocolate coated candies with nut and fruit centers; Nougatines and Turkish pastes.
- (2) Hard boiled candies, as fruit tablets, brittles, taffies, etc.
- (3) Marshmallows, etc.
- (4) Gum drops, jollies, etc.
