POTATO GROWERS GET FAVORABLE REPLY

Part of T. Joseph Lynch in behalf of Farmers brings Reply that New Legislation is being enacted Favorable.

Joseph Lynch received the following letter from Senator James W. Wadsworth, Jr., yesterday in reply to the letter recently sent him, accompanied by a statement signed by over one hundred fifty Andover farmers. If the legislation is passed as outlined by Senator Wadsworth, it will mean an immense stimulation of the number of acres of potatoes planted this year in this section.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your letter of March sixth with the enclosed statement of the potato growers of Andover and vicinity regarding the Food Administration's change in the grading of potatoes. Since your order was issued the Senate has had under consideration the Agricultural Appropriation Bill and on Thursday, March 14th, an amendment was adopted without debate which provides as follows:

"That no part of the money herein appropriated, or any unexpended balance heretofore appropriated, shall be used to defray the expenses of the Food Administration or any other department of the Government, in the matter of grading potatoes, and regulation shall be made there. Provided Further, that it shall not be lawful to grade potatoes as to size or otherwise in excess of the marketable value of such products, and that the disease harmful to the public health."

I trust that this legislation will remain in the appropriation bill when it goes to the President for his signature and that it meets the objections of the potato growers.

WASHES AUTO

In order to avoid a collision with the big Alfred bus, Park Rogers, of Andover, Saturday night drove his big eight-cylinder into the ditch and wrecked it. The bridge, about two miles west of Hornell on the Alfred road, he also ripped the edge off the small wooden bridge which spans a narrow stream at that point.

Mr. Rogers had been working the city and was on his way home shortly before 7 o'clock. He was with three other men in the machine. As they approached the bridge they met the bus which had come caught in the rut and it was a question of whether Mr. Rogers should take to the ditch for the bus, which was loaded with passengers. He chose the ditch.

The big car darted back and took the heavy railing on the edge, ripping off a wheel and doing considerable damage to the rear end of the car. Fortunately there was no one injured.

The bridge, where the accident occurred, is a particularly dangerous one. It is too narrow for cars to pass on it and is so old that it is difficult to see a car coming in the opposite direction.
