The division canteen headquarters is a clearing house for information re-garding troop movements, camps, etc. to all the men.

of them women in uniform. They are either at headquarters or on call by telephone during the "waking hours, the nearby canteen stations and assist the local women in serving the soldiers during these hours.

In fact, the canteen is a twenty four-hour service. If the Red Cross is informed that refreshments are needed at any time during the day or nigh they are on hand to meet the needs of the men. The hotels in New York city generously give coffee, cheese, etc., for the Red Cross canteens.

Sandwiches, fruit, sweet buns, chocolate and hot coffee comprise the usual fare. If the men are not actually hungry they are given chocolate and "smokes." If they are not in need of food of any kind they are always given the "emergancy" service. The emergency nature of the canteen service, the out-of-the-way spots where it is often needed, the irregular hours when it is called for the dark wharves and crowded ferry houses where the trains are held—all these features make the work a difficult one. In spite of these difficulties, however, the canteen is considered one of the most wficient branches of the Red Cross.


