According to a report there are 28 vacant houses in Buffalo, 108 flats, one rooming house, 300 rooms, and stores, and 61 single houses, and flats being built.

Because he made a sailor's wife pay 14 cents a pound for sugar, the license of Frank Brown, a wholesale grocer in New York, has been suspended for two weeks.

The senate confirmed Governor Whitman's nomination of George W. Davis of Poughkeepsie as a member of the state prison commission to succeed Richard M. Hurd, resigned.

James B. Stafford, federal food administrator of Erie county, will enforce Mr. Hoover's order directing farmers to sell their wheat, reserving only enough for seed, by the first of May.
