DEATH OF FORMER PASTOR

Rev. R. C. Grames Dies at Close of Prayer, Wednesday

The Rev. R. C. Grames, pastor of the Methodist Church of Dalton, died very suddenly about 2 o'clock Wednesday at the Methodist Church in Canisteo, while attending the Corning district conference, which is in session there. He was about 55 years old and death is believed to have been due to heart disease.

The conference had just assembled for the afternoon session. Rev. Grames had pronounced the opening prayer and as he started to sit down he pitched forward. He was carried to the basement of the church where he died before a physician could be summoned.

Rev. Grames was well known in Andover where he served as pastor of the Methodist Church some years ago.
