BELMONT'S MILK PLANT

The Dispatch Gives the Following of Their New Industry

For the benefit of the ordinary mortal let it be known that the concern erecting the powdered milk plant and the owners of the condenser in this village are two distinct concerns, altho under a common head. The former is known as the Borden's Condensed Milk Company and the latter as the Borden's Farm Products Company.

Several cars of steel have arrived during the past week and is being hauled to the building site.

With the arrival of the steam shovel Tuesday, the concrete work is being rushed. The contractor has some twenty-five or thirty men on this work alone.

Well No. 2 has been "drilled in" this week at a depth of 135 feet and has proven itself a wonder. It flows natural 60 gallons per minute and is expected to do better than 200 gallons under compressed air. Well No. 1 is holding up at 150 gallons per minute. A site has been selected for well No. 3. That wells No. 1 and 2 will not conflict with each other is proven by the fact that one was struck at 97 feet and the other at a depth of 135 feet.

The company has erected a machine shop and an engine house and with nearly fifty men at work presents a most unusual sight for these parts.

ANGELICA DON'T WANT GAS DISCONTINUED

Albany, Oct. 27—Angelica, Allegany county, through its village board filed a complaint, upon which there will be an early hearing, asking the Public Service Commission, Second District, to investigate the proposed refusal of the Producer's Gas Company to serve natural gas after Dec. 1st. The company has served its 400 consumers in Angelica for about 19 years. The village officials allege that this proposed action is unreasonable, unfair and unjust, an imposition upon the public and a damage to the village and its inhabitants and will result in great inconvenience, discomfort and suffering.

GAME LAW

The News has been asked by the authorities to call attention of our readers to article 177 of the Conservation Laws.

We take the following from the Game Book:

"Traps for the purpose of taking fur-bearing animals prohibited by the law shall not be staked or set in any manner during the closed season for the same."

It has been reported to the authorities that some of the Andover trappers were in the habit of staking traps a day or two before in order to hold position. This must be discontinued.
