MISSIONARY MEETING

The Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church will meet Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Beebe, 101 North Street, at 7:30 o'clock.

A "liberal dry" is to have charge of federal enforcement of national prohibition in New York state. He is Charles R. O'Connor of Hobart, Delaware county, one of the best known lawyers in Central New York. Mr. O'Connor formerly served as chief counsel for the state excise department under Commissioner William W. Farley. His headquarters will be in Albany.

The state department of terms and markets announced that hearings would be held during December not only in New York but in various cities to which acts on the bill proposed to be passed by the state legislature. The bill is to be heard in Albany on December 18th and 19th.
