It is now up to the Village of Andover to improve the road from the end of the pavement to the town line, and thus put for all time an end to this impassible road.

There is not a road coming into Andover that brings more business to town or draws more freight from Andover than this Greenwood road. It is the trunk line leading out of town chapel: from which numerous branch roads start.
