The secretary of state has placed an order for 75,000 sets of plates for New York motorists to use next year.

These plates are now being turned out at Auburn prison at the rate of 4000 sets a day. Delivery has been made of about 100,000 sets to the New York office and shipments are also under way to the Albany and Buffalo automobile bureaus.

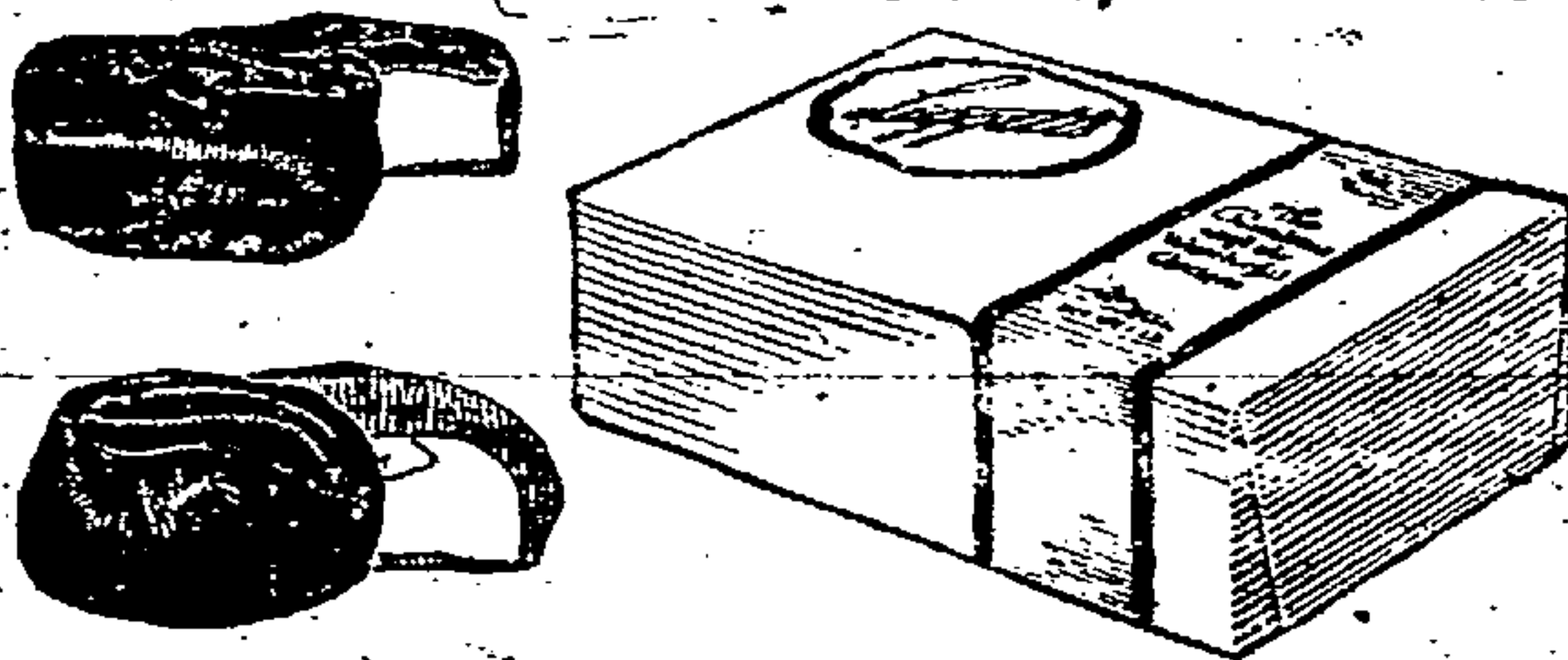
