WANTED GRADING PLAN FOR STATE POTATOES

Both Grower and Consumer Expected to Benefit as Result of Conference Held in Syracuse

A plan for grading and marketing potatoes which promises to be to the advantage of both growers and consumers was evolved at Syracuse last week when representatives from all the potato growing counties of the state met in conference.

Warehouse facilities capable of storing a large part of the crop will enable growers, it was pointed out, to prevent overcrowding of markets in the fall which would force prices down, will facilitate economical distribution and permit establishment of standard grades for protection of the consumer and benefit of the producer.

A resolution was passed expressing the sense of the meeting that the state department of farms and markets should be asked, as the only body having power, to establish uniform grades for potatoes, conforming as nearly as possible to federal grades.

Some discussion arose regarding the form of organization for the statewide selling organization. It was decided that effort should be directed at present to organizing local associations and develop the statewide one when the situation demands it.

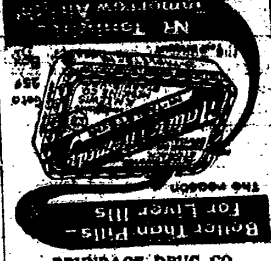
