FORD AND HORSE COLLIDE

Icy Pavement Causes Car to Skid Into Horse and Buggy

A Ford car, owned and driven by Jesse Harris, of Franklinville, N. Y., and a horse and buggy driven by M. V. Lynch of South Hill, came together at the top of the hill on Chestnut Street, Saturday evening, killing the horse and badly jamming up the body of the Ford.

The car contained four men who had been cutting wood at Alvah Baker's, between here and Alfred, and were on their way home to pass Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Lynch were coming to Andover. Both parties arrived at the top of the hill at the same time and neither saw the other until they were about to meet when the driver of the car turned the machine to meet the horse; the back end skidded on the icy pavement and went broadside of the road, the rear door catching the horse in the breast-piling up both horse, buggy and car in the middle of the road.

The occupants of both rigs miraculously escaped injury, with the exception of the man in the back seat of the car on the side that struck the horse. He was badly shaken up and hurt internally. A physician was called and upon examination pronounced his condition not serious, taking the man back to town where he could be kept quiet.

It is a wonder that accidents have not happened at this place before as it is impossible to see any one coming up the hill on the opposite side until both arrive at the top.
