IN HEALTH

The Common Bean Has Growth Promoting Substance and is a Cheap Food as Well

Knowing beans and knowing what valuable food beans are seem to be two different things. In fact, according to the workers in home economics at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca, not many families have beans on the table as often as they might to the advantage both of health and pocketbook.

When combined with milk and eggs, beans furnish one of the best clean-building foods and they contain necessary growth-promoting substances; furthermore, they are cheap. Bean chowder, croquettes, salad in combination with tomatoes, cabbage, peanuts or green peppers and onions, and sandwich filling are some of the ways suggested by the State College at Ithaca for using beans, so they may not become tiresome.

Soak Them Overnight
Before cooking dry beans, they should be soaked from six to eight hours, or over night, and, if possible, in soft water.

Some persons find it difficult to digest beans. The indigestible portion is usually the skins; but if beans are parboiled in soda water for 30 to 40 minutes and stirred briskly the skins will come to the top and may be skimmed off; the beans may be dipped in cold water after parboiling, and then rubbed between the hands until the skins come off.

The following recipes are recommended:

Beans with cheese: I can kidney beans, 3 ounces of cheese cut fine, 1 green pepper cut fine, salt and pepper. Combine ingredients and cook slowly until thoroughly heated, from 10 to 15 minutes.

Bean loaf: 2 cups soaked beans, 1 egg, beaten, 1 cup bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons tomato catsup or tomato pulp, salt, pepper, 1 tablespoon finely minced onion. Combine the ingredients and shape the mixture into a loaf. Bake it for 25 minutes and serve it with catsup or tomato sauce.
