## SUCCESSFUL STATE **GRANGE MEETING**

#### Ask For More Money For Other Rural Interests Emphasized

phasized

Utica, Feb. 7.—The attitude of the great body of farmers of the state toward questions affecting their welfare was shown in the 117 resolutions presented and adopted at the closing session of the New York State Grango-convention here to-day.

Demand was made for the repeal of the congervation laws, so that trespassing may be made punishable as a misdemeanor. A resolution was also adopted favoring a more equitable distribution of the automobile tax money which is now on the basis of 75 per cent. to the automobile tax money which is now on the basis of Grangers for the work of the New York State Troopers. Some constitutional changes in the national body, necessary to be ratified before acceptance by three-fourths of the state Granges were adopted.

More Money For Schools Another subject acted upon was the matter of changes in the rural school system of the state, it being decided to ask the Legislature for an increased share of the public school money on the ground that the country districts are at present discriminated against in the distribution. It was

It was decided that representatives of the organization also will oppose any measures brought before the present sassion of the Legislature for the reorganization of the rural school system of the state and will argue that it would be better to wait a year for the final report of the Committee of Twenty-one now making an exhaustive investivation of the subject. decided that representatives of the

### TELLS GERMANY SHE MUST PAY

#### Premier Lloyd George Says Germany Has Not Reen Level With France and Great Britain

Pirminghino, England, Feb. 5. (By Associated Press — The British Prime Ministers advice to Germany is to accept the bill for reparations as formulated by the Supreme Council at Paris.

"Our claim is a righteous one and we must enforce ..." Mr. blood we must enforce ..." Mr. Lloyd leorge declared in a speech here to-lay when he received the freedom of he city.

we must enforce ..." Mr. Lloyd George declared in a speech here today when he received the freedom of the city.

He replied to the speech in the Richstag recently by Dr. Walter Simons, in which the German Foreign Minister stated that the reparations plan could not be accepted by Germany as a basis for negotiations.

The Premier said:

"A great part of his speech was based on a complete misconception of what had been done at Paris.

"Such misconception could be cleared up in the forthcoming London conference.

"If a full bill were sent to Germany according to the Versailles. Treaty she would be compelled to accept it, but I fail tose how that would improve matters, and I very respectables. improve matters, and I very respect-fully advise Dr. Simons to take the Paris bill.

"If he has any alternative proposals the Allies are prepared to consider them, so long as the proposals represent a bonafide effort to liquidate the liabilities of Germany.

"We are willing that Germany should pay us under conditions which best suit her own means, requirements and resources but if it.
