Rhubarb can be had in the gard

Rhubarb can be had in the garden a week to ten days earlier than ordinarily, if provisions are made for protecting a few of the plants from cold nights and bad weather.

An inexpensive and simple method, suggested by the cardeness at, the State College of Agriculture, is to bace one-half of an old barrel, a lox with the bottom and top removed, or a small coldframe over each of a few plants about the time they are coming thru the ground. This will protect the plant from cold winds, anow, and, to a large extent, kepthe ground from alternately freezing and thawing in early spring.
