Jesus was a small-town man, says North American Review. He was born with the Beloved Universe of God in his soul who lived a few terrible and flaming years in the cave and jungle-size folk. And we still ignore him and the highlands of his challenges.

The following quotation indicates the reasons for calling him a small-town man:

"We preached the Kingdom of God, showing God for a spirit and having an increasing realization of the Kingdom as a state of being. But he had no program. He followed the inward voice, and followed it instinctively, with the freedom of a river in its natural channel, with no fretting of the fish. But where the voice left him uninformed, he was simply a man like Nazareth; his social outlook was the outlook of a villager. All the metaphysics of Israel had come out of the wilderness; their words were full of the terrible things—thunders, earthquakes, fire on the mountains. But the words of Jesus are all of the small town—the candle and the bushel, the housewife's measure of the children playing in the street. The rich he knew only as the poor and the oppressed knew them; the kings of his parables were the kings of fairy tale and legend; such things as political power as make the world of the village story-teller. His way of speaking was a folk-way, a simple, direct, and pregnant figure. He saw God reflected in every common life, and he saw in the common life, after that a perfected form of the life that he saw in God. That is why so many of them were remembered, while his preaching escaped his audience. He was a man wise in life, but unlearned. He read no books but the Scriptures; wrote nothing; took the folkway of transmitting his teaching from mouth to mouth, and trusted God for the increase; and he had the folk-way in his profoundest speech, of identifying himself with the Power that used him. He dramatized all his relations to the Invisible.

Jesus had no religion to offer—only an interpretation of Life, God's Life, the Perfect Love, man's life the replica of God, potentially immortal, with Eternal Life as the end of evolutionary processes.

The little man has always been concerned about the "future life." That is mechanical to a degree. There is Eternal Life!

The actual teaching of Jesus is not to be compassed into rigid forms and unyielding tenets. He crystallized certain principles which make the expanding program of the modern world.

The logic of his ideas gives unlimited impulse to extension of the community of God. His ideas are dynamic and not static. No creed is permanent, no dogma is fixed. A mechanical view of the writing called the Bible hopelessly poisons the mind. But like a diamond in its matrix are the ideas of Jesus, which too often beyond the perception of many.

To him the Universe was a community; so close was his thinking that he attributed it to God, as if it were his friend that he loved it was God himself, and he loved it as himself. MAPLE PRODUCTS CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED

Marketing and Educational Work

Both on Program: F. R. Crawford, Committeeman.

Representatives from all parts of the county attended a meeting at Belmont, on Wednesday, February 9th, at which time the organization of the Allegany County Co-operative Maple Products Association Incorporated was completed. The purpose or object of the association will be the encouraging of a more proficient production of high quality maple syrup. Also the mutual help of the individual members by collective marketing of their products. Already communication has been received from one large company which did business in this section last year looking forward to returning to Allegany County for the purchase of several carloads of syrup. Last year they came to this county for the first time and as they were late in getting started it was impossible to get more than one carload.

Allegany County is known to produce as good maple products as any part of the state, and is the largest producer of any county in Western

that each individual had in mind some outside market for the maple. With a Co-operative Association through which the products from all over the county can be collected it will be possible to look after large orders, and in this way save a great many people a lot of trouble and expense in the marketing of their product.

The United States is practically the only country producing any quantity of maple products and as New York State produces nearly a third of the entire amount, it is readily seen that there is a big possibility of developing a market through most of the country. There is a demand for this product in many sections where there is absolutely no supply, but the high cost of shipment makes it prohibitive to put the product on these markets in small quantities.

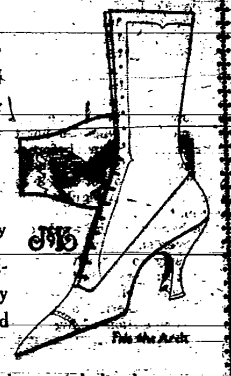
