She laid down on the floor and her son placed a pillow under her head. He urged her to let him call a doctor but she told him she would be alright and he curled up on a Morris chair nearby and went to sleep.

Shortly before 5 o'clock he awoke and endeavored to arouse his mother but failed. Then he became alarmed and summoned one of the neighboring women who immediately called Dr. Morie A. Place. Mrs. Fergusson was dead, however, before he arrived. It is believed that she took an overdose of headache tablets, which often times contain a small percentage of acetanilide.

Mrs. Fergusson was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Considine, of Cameron Mills, by whom she is survived and her son, Robert and one brother, Percy Considine of Rochester. The body was taken to Cameron Mills yesterday and the funeral services and burial will take place there. She recently divorced her husband.
