HAY and FEED: Hay market down \$1.00-\$2.00 on all kinds. Timothy receipts generally light but equal to the limited demand. Heavy receipts of alfalfa, mostly low grades, from Northwest demoralizing. Kansas City and Omaha markets, prairie also in light demand at lower prices. No. 1 Timothy, New York \$31.50, Philadelphia \$24.00, Pittsburgh \$24.50, Cincinnati \$23.00, Chicago \$24.00, St. Louis \$27.00, No. 1 Alfalfa, Kansas City \$18.50, Omaha \$18.00, Jacksonville \$32.50, Memphis \$28.00, No. 1 Prairie, Kansas City \$12.00, Omaha \$8.00, Minneapolis \$15.50, Chicago \$19.00.

Pacific Coast, Southeastern and Southwestern feed markets with lower tendencies. Middlewestern and Northeastern markets firm. Jobbers demand good but country trade unsatisfactory. Coconut meal in good shape in Pacific market and offered \$24.00. Transit wheat feeds higher. Linseed meal, cottonseed meal and hominy feed easier; Gluten feed unchanged. Stocks large, movement lower than week ago and in poor demand. Bran \$21.00, Middlings \$20.50, Rye Middlings \$18.50, Minneapolis 36 per cent. cottonseed meal \$26.50, Memphis \$33.00, Chicago linseed meal \$36.50, Minneapolis \$40.50, Buffalo No. 1 Alfalfa meal \$19.00, Kansas City \$21.50, St. Louis white hominy feed \$23.00, St. Louis, \$30.00, New York, Gluten feed \$40. Beet Pulp \$32.00, Philadelphia. Oat feed \$10.00, Chicago.

LIVE STOCK and MEATS: Sheep and Lamb prices at Chicago advanced sharply the past week. Most grades of Cattle were moderately higher, the Hogs declined 5c-20c per 100 lbs. Light weights declining most. Fat Lambs and Yearlings up 75c to \$1.25. Feeding Lambs were steady 25c higher. Beef Steers, Best Cows and Heifers gained 50c. Lower grade Butcher Cattle unchanged. Feeder Steers advanced 50c-\$1.00. February 21 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales \$8.85-\$9.50. Medium and Good Beef Steers \$8.25-\$9.00. Butcher Cows and Heifers \$4.00-\$9.25. Feeder Steers \$7.00-\$8.75. Light and Medium weight Veal Calves \$9.25-\$12.00. Fat Lambs \$7.00-\$10.25. Feeding Lambs \$6.25-\$7.50. Yearlings \$5.75-\$7.75. Fat Ewes \$8.75-\$6.00.

Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices were higher compared with a week ago. Beef advanced \$1-\$1.50. Lambs \$1-\$2. Pork Loins \$1.50-\$2 per 100 lbs. Veal and Mutton steady to \$1.00 higher. February 21 prices, Good Grade Beef \$14.50-\$16.00. Veal \$18-\$21. Lambs \$19-\$21. Mutton \$11-\$14. Light Pork Loins \$21-\$24. Heavy Loins \$16-\$17.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: Butter prices have advanced daily the past week and market is very firm. Stocks are well cleared up especially the better

grades. Receipts of Fresh Butter at Chicago not equal to demand and storage is being taken. Snow at New York has delayed deliveries and prices advanced 1c on the East at three Eastern markets, 1/4c at Chicago. Prices 92 score, Philadelphia 49 1/2c, New York and Boston 49c, Chicago 48 1/2c.

Cheese-market rules quiet in Eastern markets with very little change in prices. Wisconsin primary markets report increased Southern demand and prices on Plymouth board. On the 21st advanced 1 1/2c. Prices, Twins 25 1/2c. Daisies 26 1/2c. Double Daisies 26 1/4c. Long Horns 25 1/2c. Young Americas 24 1/2c. Square Prints 27c.

GRAIN: Prices advanced at the opening of the week's trading upon continued reports of Green Bugs in Southwest. A three day decline then set in as a result of overabundant condition, larger movement small demand, lack of export business, and colder weather in Bug Territory. Renewal of export business and light offerings started prices higher on the 19th and 21st and the week closed with a net advance of 1 1/2c in Chicago March Wheat, 1 1/2c. Chicago May Corn. Country offerings Southwestern not large but consignments liberal result last week's sales on advanced. Cold wet weather continues in Southwest but bug reports still coming from Texas and Oklahoma. Visible supply wheat decreased 714,000 bushels during week. Good wheat demand Minneapolis with country mills in market for Spring. Country offerings corn very light. Visible supply decreased 697,000 bushels during week. Chicago March Wheat closed \$1.71 3/4; May Corn 61 3/4c. Minneapolis March Wheat up 1 1/4c at \$1.58 1/2. Kansas City March 1c at \$1.62; Minnipeg May 2c at \$1.87 1/2; Chicago May Wheat \$1.61 3/4.

FRUITS and VEGETABLES: Sacked Round White Potatoes held at 90-95c per 100 lbs. f. o. b. Northern shipping stations. Chicago carlot market up 10c at \$1.10-\$1.20 sacked. Round Whites showed further weakness at Western New York shipping points, reaching 90-95c. New York market weak, sacked stock around \$1.15.

Cold storage Baldwin Apples firm. Western New York f. o. b. stations around \$4.25 per bbl. Baldwins steady in city markets at \$4.50-\$5. Northwestern extra fancy Winesaps steady. New York and Boston \$3.50-\$4.50 per box. Pittsburgh \$3-\$3.75. Middlewestern markets mostly \$3-\$4. Florida Celery weaker in consuming markets at \$2.50-\$3.25 per crate. Shipping points slightly lower-\$1.50-\$1.60 f. o. b. cash track. California Golden Heart Celery weaker in Middlewestern markets at wide range of \$4.50-\$6.50 per crate. Shipping stations steady 30c-35c per doz. bunches.

Sacked Yellow Onions slightly weaker at Western New York shipping points around 75c per 100 lbs. Consuming market steady to firm, mostly 90c-\$1.10. Carlot shipments weak ended February 19th: Potatoes 2,556 cars; Boxed Apples 519, Barreled Apples 1,005; Old Cabbage 259, New Cabbage 278. Old Celery 122, new celery 359. Lettuce 512. Onions 414. Spinach 128. Sweet Potatoes 378. Tomatoes 87. Shipments week ended February 12th; Potatoes 2,806 cars.

Boxed Apples 406, Barreled Apples 1,036. Old Cabbage 264, new Cabbage 207. Old Celery 165, new Celery 291. Lettuce 464. Onions 364. Spinach 134. Sweet Potatoes 402. Tomatoes 42.
