MORE FARM NEWS IS NEED OF THE WEEKLY

Local Newspaper Can Be the Best Farm Journal If It Realize Its Possibilities

That the local weekly newspaper is after all the best farm journal was one of the points brought out at the country newspaper conference, held as a feature of Farmers' Week at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca last week. It was pointed out that some, however, are not living up to their possibilities. This conference was inaugurated last year and its purpose is to encourage the country weekly, which has come to be recognized as one of the important factors in promoting a wholesome and satisfying rural life.

One feature of the conference was a country newspaper contest in which 214 papers were entered. Alto no general or sweepstakes prize was awarded, the Freeman's Journal of Cooperstown, Oswego County, may perhaps be considered the best of the newspapers entered.

According to the awards made, it won in three classes, just exceeding the Delaware Republican of Delhi, which won a first and second. The only other paper that won in more than a single contest was the Pelham Sun of Pelham, Westchester County. Because some papers were able to win in more than one class, eight papers shared the twelve awards for first, second and third places in four classes.

List of Winners
For the best front page make-up, the awards were as follows: First, Massena Observer, Massena, St. Lawrence County; second, Livingston Republican, Geneseo, Livingston County; third, Pelham Sun, Pelham, Westchester County.

Best make-up of inside pages: First, Delaware Republican, Delhi; second, Pelham Sun; third, Freeman's Journal.

Best editorial page: First, Rhinebeck Gazette, Dutchess County, second, Freeman's Journal, Cooperstown; third, Nassau County Review, Freeport.

Best local farm news: First, Freeman's Journal; second, Delaware Republican, Delhi; and third, Altamont Enterprise, Altamont, Albany County.

Only One Repeats
Of the winners in last year's contest, only one, the Delaware Republican, which won a third place in the class for paper that best served its community, was able to repeat this year, tho the Warrensburg News, of Warren County was a close contender in the front-page make-up competition, in which it won first prize last year.

The attendance and interest in the conferences far exceeded that of last year.
