Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending Feb. 28th, 1921.)

HAY: Wintry weather curtailed shipments of hay during the week but failed to stimulate demand. Bad roads and unsatisfactory prices also important factor in light movement.

FEED: Easier tone noticeable in heavily about a week ago for prompt feed market. Buyers contracted and future shipment. Absence of demand from country buyers causing many to discount Western shipment prices to some extent in order to move part of holdings.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES: Sacked Round White Potatoes up 10c per 100-lbs. at Northern shipping stations, reaching \$1-11.05. Chicago car lot market gained an additional 5.10c, closing \$1-20-25 sacked.

Feb. 28 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales \$9.40-\$10.35; medium and good beef steers \$3.65-\$10.25; butcher cows and heifers \$5-\$10; feeder steers \$7.25-\$9; light and medium weight veal calves \$10-\$12.25; fat lambs \$9-\$11.25; feeding lambs \$7.25-\$8.75; yearlings \$7.25-\$9.75; fat ewes \$5.50-\$7.25.
