Albany, March 8.— With a total of 4,774 cars, representing a gain of 818 for the year, Allegany County has a car' to every eight of its residents. The report of Secretary of State John J. Lyons shows a total of 682,919 motor vehicles, exclusive of motorcycles, registered in New Yorkstate last year, an increase of 71,257, or 19 Per Cent. This gives the state a car to every fifteen of its population.
