TRAGEDY AT THE GRAVE

Angela Gavin, who died in Los Angeles Saturday last, will be buried from the Holy Family Church, to-morrow, Monday, at 9 A. M., and will be followed to the grave by a large group of friends who have known him since boyhood, when he entered the oil fields back in Pennsylvania in the early '80s. There is the closest kind of fellowship between the old timers and all will remember Mr. Gavin as being true to the ideals of the early oil men, and who was a pioneer in the mid-continent field and in Mexico, and has had all the ups and downs that beset the average oil man.

Mr. Gavin was on the way to fame and fortune when he was taken suddenly ill, being one of the principal promoters of a big English concern which is operating in Wyoming and Montana. He had been recuperating at Excelsior Springs and had gone to California, expecting to take up the work of an active drilling campaign with the opening of spring. Mr. Gavin was born on a farm near Andover, N. Y., in 1862, and was therefore nearing his fifty-ninth birthday.

To his wife and family there is extended the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community. Mrs. Gavin has always been prominent in the social affairs and her daughters likewise have been leaders in musical and dramatic circles. Austin Gavin, the eldest son, is associated with Shea & Shea, prominent attorneys, and James H. occupies a position of trust with the Imperial Refining Company, well known as leaders in the independent oil and refining circles.

Anthony Gavin, of Anderson, and a brother of the deceased, is here for the funeral, and many other out-of-town friends are expected. —Tulsa, Okla., paper.

Wool Men Organize

Specialists Urge Marketing of Wool thru State Fair

At a series of meetings held for the sheep men during the past week arrangements were made for the starting of a County Sheep Breeders Association. Professor Gramma, a sheep specialist from the State College of Idaho, spoke on "Advantages of Selling Wool thru the State Fair and the Benefits that Could be Derived by the Grading and Sales under this Plan." He also took up the treatment of the diseases commonly affecting the sheep in this state and the methods of prevention and control.

Practically everyone attending these meetings was in favor of arranging to ship the wool to the Syracuse warehouse where it will be graded and sold direct to the buyers. It is expected that arrangements will be made for the starting of the County Association by the Farm Bureau in the near future.
