WATCH OUT FOR THE WHITE G

Farmers Will Be Wise Not To Plan Corn and Potatoes on Recently Corn and Potatoes on Recently Turned Sod Land This Year

will be abundant this year, farmors will do well not to plant corn or personal control and the control and the

will, be abundant this year, farmers will do well not to plant corn or petatoes on recently turned sed land, unless they are aquite certain it is not infested with the grubs, according to a warning being sent out by the state entomologist and the entomologists at the state college of agriculture.

These pests usually appear at three year intervals, and since they got in their deadly work in 1918 there is every reason to expect they will not skip 1921. These grubs are the young of the large brown May or June beetles, sometimes so abundant in early summer as to injure seriously the leaves, or nearly defoliate a great number of trees, particularly oak and chestnut, though birch and even maples are sometimes badly damaged. Not only do insects commonly appear at three year, intervals, but the injury to foliage et one season is very likely to be followed by serious damage in adjacent grassiands, or the crops planted thereupon, the following summer.
