 The High School building at Lit-

 building.

 Warning has been issued to citi-
 zens of the county of a clever gang
 of crooks operating in Western New
 York who are obtaining subscriptions
 under false pretense. Several years
 ago a gang of five book agents operat-
 ing on an advertising scheme took
 close to \$10,000 from business men
 and farmers.
 A large Buick touring car came
 to grief Sunday morning in attempting
 to make the turn, corner of Elm and
 Barney Streets, and was badly crip-
 pled in the job. One of the pas-
 sengers had his face and nose bruised
 and cut with the broken glass from
 the wind shield. Any or so later a

 with a drop of 5 1/2 per cent. for the

 statistics.

 Cuba, were made violently ill last

 table. Physicians believe, by mis-
 take he dug a root of aconite, or
 Monk's hood, as it is often called. It
 is claimed the root and leaf closely
 resemble horseradish.
 A law suit which called wide-
 spread interest was held Tuesday, at
 Canaseraga. T. C. Newton sued
 Grant Deiter, his farmer, for neglect
 in gathering the crops. The trial took
 place before C. G. Bacon, justice of
 the peace, and a jury. The jury
 brought in a verdict in favor of the
 defendant, giving him a judgment of
 \$24.89.
 There will be a meeting of the
 Western New York Fair Managers
 Association in Buffalo on March 24th
 to complete the arrangements for the
 Western New York Fair this summer.
 The final arrangements as to dates
 and racing program and conditions will
 be completed at this time. Secretary
