In the latest "Reported Tests of Holstein-Friesian Cows," published bi-weekly by Malcolm H. Gardner, Delavan, Wis., Supt. of Advanced Registry of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, Est. W. R. Crandall, of Andover, New York, has two of their pure-bred registered Holstein cows listed.

One cow, Eulein Butter Maid, is reported as having made at the age of eight years and seven months, a record of 717.2 lbs. of milk and 20,697 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 25,871 lbs. of butter. Her record for fourteen days is 1,419.3 lbs. of milk and 39,671 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 49,588 lbs. of butter.

The other cow, Adele Colantha Mona Johanna, is reported as having made at the age of six years and eleven months, a record of 663.4 lbs. of milk and 20,516 lbs. of butter fat in seven days, equivalent to 26,645 lbs. of butter. Her record for four 40.114 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 50,137 lbs. of butter.

Tests of this kind are supervised by one or more representatives from the Dairy Division of the State College of Agriculture, present at each feeding and milking, to weigh the milk and test it for butter fat content. A duplicate sample of this milk is forwarded to the State College, where careful check is made before the record is reported.

THE JEFFERSON BANQUET

The National Democratic Club of New York City will celebrate the 178th Birthday of Thomas Jefferson, by a banquet to be given at the Hotel Astor, on the evening of Saturday, April 9, 1921.
