GRASS GOOD, FRUIT PROSPECTS POOR. NO SCARCITY OF FARM LABOR.

The U. S. Bureau of Crop Estimates reports that weather conditions in this state this spring have been favorable for farm work and for grain and fruit crops, but not for fruit. The temperature during March was 10 degrees above normal and only 44 degrees below the usual temperature for April. Meadows and pastures are starting early, and the condition of winter wheat, which usually averages about 85 per cent. maturity at this time of the year, is now 90 per cent. The unseasonable warm weather has caused fruit buds to open too early and a large proportion of the cherry blossoms have been killed. In some places peaches, plums and apples have been badly hurt and there is considerable danger that further damage will be caused by frosts during the next few weeks.

There is now no scarcity of men for farm work in this state for, according to the large number of reports from farmers received by the Itasca office of the U. S. Bureau of Crop Estimates, farmers expect to need 8 per cent. less help than they did last year. Farmers around cities and factory towns report that many

men are out of work, but that few of them are seeking employment on the farms at wages which farmers can afford to pay. In the state as a whole, the available supply of farm labor on April 1st, was reported to be 15 per cent. greater than it was last year, but still 10 per cent. below normal. On account of high rents in cities, there seems to be a larger proportion of married men than usual among those seeking work on the farms.

RESPONSIBILITY DIVIDED

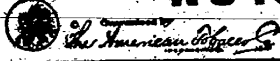

POOLING CAMPAIGN

OVER TOP MAY 1ST

The time which dairymen have been looking forward to and working toward for many months has at last arrived. The Executive Committee of the Dairymen's League Co-operative Association, at a meeting on April 12th, voted to pool on May 1st the milk of all those members who had signed the co-operative contracts. This action of the League's Executive Committee will have to be confirmed by the Board of Directors which will meet on April 22nd, but inasmuch as the Co-operative Association will have more than its 50,000 contracts on May 1st, there is no doubt that the directors will confirm the decision of their Executive Committee. No other decision that has ever been made in the dairy industry is of such far-reaching importance as this decision to pool, and the names will be more than welcome to those thousands of farmers who have been without a regular market for their milk since October 1st.

The Dairymen's League Co-operative Association is busily engaged in hiring the necessary help and installing accounting and other equipment for the proper handling and safeguarding of the proceeds of its members' milk.

It is expected that the final decision to pool will have an immediate effect upon thousands of men who have hesitated as to whether or not they should sign the Dairymen's League Co-operative contract. Many have been waiting to see whether the campaign to get 50,000 subscribers to the contract could be brought to a successful close, and now, assured that the pooling is actually to begin on a definite date, those men will hasten to get in line with their neighbors and fellow dairymen throughout League territory in order to be assured of a regular market for their product.
