\$5,000 AWARDS IN PICTURE PLAY TITLE TESTS

The New York American is conducting a \$5,000 Picture Play Title Test in which a main award of \$1,000 is offered to the person who can identify the largest percentage of drawings representing photoplay titles.

There is a second award of \$750, and a third award of \$500. The other 216 awards range from \$400 down to \$5. The test begins Sunday, April 17, and lasts sixty days.

Every resident of any city or town in the following states is eligible to participate:

New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and District of Columbia.

Each day during the test there will be printed in the New York American a picture representing the title of a photoplay. With the picture will be printed a list of photo titles. The correct title is always to be found in the printed list.

Local motion picture theatres are given an opportunity to tie up with this unique test. The New York American will furnish free upon request a daily slide showing the picture printed that day in the American. The newspaper will also supply gratis a colored poster telling of the feature.

THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending April 22nd, 1921.)

GRAIN: Prices declined the first part of week due to large country offerings; lack of demand, reports of foreign sailing and British labor situation. But on the 14th settlement British strike and development of export demand started an upturn that continued until the 18th. Freezing temperatures and blizzard in winter wheat belt also factors influencing an advance. Later on the 19th buying fell out and with Minneapolis market weak in prospect emergency tariff bill all grains declined sharply before the close. Seven hundred sixty-five thousand bushels Canadian wheat received Duluth since navigation opened; 300,000 bushels due to arrive on 18th. Export demand slow. Visible supply wheat 17,431,000 bushels, showing decrease 446,000 for week. Exports continue to be slow. Visible supply corn 81,064,000 bushels, showing decrease 1,622,000 for week. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.30 1/2, No. 2 hard \$1.37 1/2, No. 3 mixed corn 54 c, No. 3 yellow 55 1/2 c, No. 3 white oats 36 c. Minneapolis May wheat down 1c at \$2.18. Kansas City May 3 1/2 c at \$1.15 1/4. Winnipeg May 12 1/2 c at \$1.50 1/4.

MEATS: Cattle and calves 38,289; hogs 13,665; sheep 5,952. Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices presented a rather mixed appearance, advances at some markets being counterbalanced by declines at others. Beef up 50c to \$1, mutton steady to \$1 higher; pork loins \$1 higher to \$2 lower depending upon weight and market. Veal generally \$2 lower; lamb steady to \$1 higher. April 18th prices good grade meats: Beef \$17 to \$13; veal \$17 to \$20; lamb \$18 to \$23; mutton \$14 to \$17; light pork loins \$7 to \$29; heavy loins \$17 to \$24.

DAIRY PRODUCTS: Butter markets unsettled the past week. Declines on the 14th and 15th followed by steadier tone, and on the 18th advances were recorded. However, Eastern markets are about 3c lower than a week ago. Liberal arrivals California butter on Eastern market during week. Closing prices, 92 score, New York 46 1/2; Chicago 46 1/2; Philadelphia, 47 1/2; Boston 47c. Cheese markets dull and inactive during week. Trading quiet regardless of fact that prices were generally reduced about 2c under previous week. Some cheese being shipped on production from Wisconsin points. Consignment increasing. Prices, Plymouth Wisconsin cheese exchange: Daisies 16 c; double daisies 16 c; young Americas 16 c; longhorns 16c.

HAY: Receipts light. Demand light and confined largely to the better grades. Despite expectation of increased shipping of alfalfa from Idaho before April 30, expectation date of reducing freight rates, prices remained steady. Prairie receipts very light but decline in timothy counteracting small arrivals and price held only firm. Clover mixed hay in poor request because of lateness of season. Choice quality with tagged weights in good demand Cincinnati. Lower grades heavily discounted in most markets. Tracks generally well cleaned up; stocks are small. Receipts Chicago heavy but well taken. Storm conditions expected to interfere with country loadings but run of hay is expected to increase as soon as planting season is over. Southern markets report demand as light because of ample grazing. FRUIT AND VEGETABLES: Northern sacked round white potatoes up 5c per 100 lbs., shipping points, closing 80 to 85c. Chicago carrot market advanced 5 to 15c at 90c to \$1.10. New York round whites down 15c. Florida No. 1 Spaulding rose in double head bbls, sold at \$7.75 to \$8 Chicago, but lost 50 to 75 per bbl. New York closing \$7.50 to \$7.75. Texas sacked Bliss triumphs up 50c per 100 lbs. Kansas City at \$6.50 to \$7. New potato shipments totalled nearly 500 car during week ended April 16; movement old stock fell off about 800 cars to \$3.22. New York cut storage 2 1/2 c. Apples firm in leading city wholesale markets at \$5.50 to \$2.25 per bbl. Chicago up \$1.50 at \$6 to \$6.50. Northwestern extra fancy Whitesaps medium to large sizes firm Chicago at \$2.50 to \$3.75 per box; small sizes \$2 to \$2.25. Middwestern yellow onions steady Chicago at 75c to \$1 per 100 lbs. Texas yellow Bermudas mixed No. 1 and No. 2 commercial pack at season's low range of \$1.50 to \$2 per standard crate consuming markets. Shipments new onions week ended April 16: 449 cars compared with 384 cars preceding week; 170 cars same week year ago. North Carolina Klondike strawberries \$5 to \$6.30 per 52 quart crate wagon loads, cash to growers at shipping points; around \$3 per 24 pint crate; f. o. b. cash truck at Louisiana stations.

COTTON: Spot cotton prices up 18 points the past week, closing \$41.10 per lb. New Orleans may futures up 4-points at 11.74c.

LIVESTOCK AND MEATS: The trend of Chicago livestock prices was downward the past week altho fat lambs advanced 50c to 75c and heavy hogs 10c per 100 lbs. Other grades of hogs lost 5c to 25c while beef hogs generally 25c lower. Feeding hogs, yearlings and fat ewes were very material changed. April 18 Chicago prices: Hogs, bulk of sales, \$14 to \$15; medium and good fat steers \$17.50 to \$18.75; butcher steers \$7 to \$8.50; light and medium weight veal calves, \$6.50 to \$9.50; yearlings \$8.25 to \$11; feeding lambs \$6 to \$8; yearlings \$7.25 to \$8.
