CATTLE FREE FROM TUBERCULOSIS

Do You Want a Heard of Such? The State and Federal Government Will Assist You

What the State and Federal Government Will Do to Assist You
 Appraise animals reacting to the test for their market value and pay you, as state indemnity, 90 per cent. of the appraised value not to exceed \$112.50 for a pure-bred or \$67.50 for a grade, in addition to the net proceeds of the sale, provided such amount does not exceed the appraised value of the animal; and pay you as Federal indemnity one-third of the difference between the appraised value of the salvage, provided that in no case shall any payment be more than \$25 for any grade animal; nor more than \$50 for any pure-bred animal, no payment to exceed the amount paid by the state.

Send a competent inspector to supervise the cleaning and disinfection of your premises if tuberculosis is found in your herd.

When your herd has passed two annual or three semi-annual tests without a reactor, it will be placed on the accredited register of the state and Federal Departments of Agriculture. You will receive an accredited herd certificate and cattle from your herd may be shipped interstate without further test for a period of one year.

Your herd, when accredited, will be listed in a booklet published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and sent to all parts of the country. Buyers of tuberculin-tested cattle will seek out your herd.

What the State and Federal Government Will Require of You
 That you submit your entire herd to examination and test at such times as are considered necessary by State or Federal officials.

That you will allow no cattle to be associated with your herd which have not passed a tuberculin test approved by State or Federal officials.

That you will thoroughly clean and disinfect your premises under the direction of State or Federal officials, if tuberculosis is found in your herd.

That all milk or other dairy products fed to your calves shall be from cows which have passed an approved tuberculin test or shall be pasteurized by heating to not less than 160 degrees F. for not less than 20 minutes.

VETERINARY FOR ALLEGANY COUNTY

At a recent session of Allegany County Farm Bureau directors a special veterinary, in the person of Robert Fuller of Cuba, was engaged to take up the accredited system of freeing cattle in Allegany County from tuberculosis, and he will begin his duties May 1st.

Bovine tuberculosis tests have been carried on for years by the state and federal government, until now, since the plan has grown so in favor and the work has reached such proportions, it is an utter impossibility to handle the work farther in the original manner.

It is expected that Dr. Fuller will have tested every herd in the county when his work is completed and the benefit to the general public will be incalculable.

The expense of testing local herds will be nominal and although done by a local man will be under the supervision of the Federal Government.

The system provides for the reimbursement of the owner of any cow that under the tests shows tendency towards tuberculosis. This reimbursement is at the joint expense of the federal and state governments.

HOW MILK WILL BE SOLD UNDER THE POOL

The directors of the Dairymen's League, at their last meeting at Utica on April 22nd and 23rd, adopted a plan by which milk prices will be determined for May and possibly for succeeding months. This plan divides League milk into four different classes, the class and the price which the milk buyer will pay for the milk depends on the way in which the buyer disposes of the final product.

Class 1. includes all milk sold in fluid form and milk made into cream and skim milk sold in fluid form. The price to the farmer for milk in class 1. will be determined by the cost of production.

Class 2. will include milk made into cream and the skim milk used in any manner desired by the buyer except that the skim milk cannot be sold and used in fluid form. Class 2. also includes milk to be made into plain condensed milk and in the manufacture of ice cream or into mixtures to be used in ice cream and milk made into cheeses of the soft cheese type, such as Philadelphia Cream, Cream, Pimento, etc.

Class 3. includes milk that is used in sterilized evaporated whole milk, milk that is manufactured into sweetened whole condensed milk, milk that is manufactured into milk powder and milk that is manufactured into cheese such as Swiss, Limburger, Pineapple, Edam and others of similar type.

Class 4. includes all milk that is made into American cheese or into butter.

The prices that will be paid Dairymen's League Co-operative Association by the dealers for all of the classes except class 1. will be determined by market conditions that exist for the different products in the different classes. Final prices for May have not yet been announced, and will be pending upon conferences between the League and the dealers to be held during the last week in April.

No matter in what class the dealer buys his milk, the returns from it will be pooled by the Co-operative Association and every farmer will receive the average price of the whole except for differentials such as freight, but-terfat and quality. This plan will insure every farmer a regular market and all of his milk at all times that the market will bring. At a time of the year when there is no surplus, his price will average high; at other times when there is a surplus, the plan enables him to take care of it thru his organization himself so that the dealer cannot use surplus milk as an excuse for buying at low prices the milk that he actually needs.

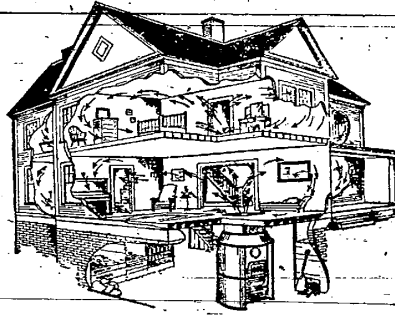

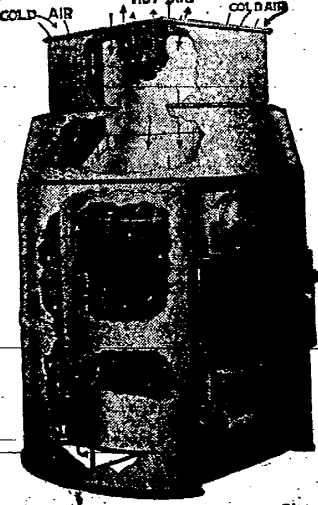
