Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending April 25th, 1921.)

HAY: Market continues dull and inactive. Receipts light. Offerings and demand about evenly balanced through the past week. Prices practically unchanged. Demand almost entirely local in most markets. Better grades of timothy in fair request; poorer grades almost unsalable. No. 1 timothy New York \$31, Philadelphia \$22, Minneapolis \$19.50, Atlanta \$30, Memphis \$27.50. No. 1 alfalfa Chicago \$23, Omaha \$20, Kansas City \$22.25, Memphis \$28, Atlanta \$30. No. 1 prairie Chicago \$18, Minneapolis \$16, Kansas City \$13, Omaha \$12.50.

FEED: Market slightly improved except for linseed meal for which demand continues poor. Better export demand for cotton seed meal caused slight advance in price. Quoted:

Linseed meal Chicago \$33.50; cottonseed meal Memphis \$25, Atlanta \$26; spring bran Philadelphia \$25, New York \$25.50, Chicago \$20; spring middlings Chicago \$19, New York \$24.50; hominy feed Chicago \$22; alfalfa meal Kansas City \$18, Chicago \$22.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES:

Round white potatoes nearly steady Northern shipping points at 75 to 85c per 100 lbs. sacked. Chicago earlot market held at 95c to \$1.05. Florida No. 1 Spaulding Rose down 50 to 75c per double head bbl. Chicago wholesale market, reaching \$7 to \$7.50; down 75c New York at \$6.75 to \$7. Texas sacked Bliss Triumphs down 75c to \$1 per 100 lbs. Kansas City at \$5.75 to \$6. Cold storage Botwin apples up 25 to 50c per bbl. in city wholesale markets, New York 74 1/2c; stock mostly \$5.75 to \$6.75 per bbl. Northwestern extra fancy Wisconsin medium to large sizes up about 25c; sizes \$2 to \$2.50. Sacked yellow onions slow and unsettled New York at 90c to \$1.25 per 100 lbs. Old onions in cold storage New York City and vicinity estimated at approximately 26,500 sacks or about 319 cars. Texas Bermudas mostly \$1.50 to \$2 per standard crate consuming markets; steady f. o. b. around \$1. Southern Klondike strawberries 30 to 35c per

quart New York wholesale market. Prices up 40 to 55c per 24 pint crate Louisiana points, closing \$3.40 to \$3.55; down 50c to \$1.30 per 32 quart crate North Carolina points at \$4.50 to \$5 wagon loads cash to growers.

LIVESTOCK AND MEATS: Cattle and hog prices at Chicago declined the past week while sheep and lamb prices advanced. Hogs lost 3c to \$1.10 per 100 lbs., light hogs declining most. Beef steers down 35c to 50c; heifers 25c; butcher cows 25 to 75c; feeder steers 65c to \$1; fat and feeding lambs and fat ewes up 50c, yearlings up 50c to 75c. April 25 Chicago prices: Hogs bulk of 200 lbs. \$7.80 to \$8.15; medium and good beef steers

\$7.25 to \$8.40; butcher cows and heifers \$4.75 to \$8.75; feeder steers \$6.80 to \$8.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$7 to \$9.50; fat lambs \$8.75 to \$11.25; feeding lambs \$7 to \$8.50; yearlings \$8 to \$9.50; fat ewes \$6.50 to \$7.25. Stocker and feeder shipments from 11 important markets during the week ending April 25 were: Cattle and calves 39,588; hogs 9,212; sheep 3,691. Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices: Veal up most. \$1 to \$4; lamb \$1 to \$3; mutton steady to \$1 higher, beef steady, pork loins weak to \$1 lower. April prices—good grade meats: Beef \$17 to \$18; veal \$18 to \$20; lamb \$21 to \$24; mutton \$15 to \$17; light pork loins \$26 to \$28; heavy loins \$17 to \$23.

GRAIN: Market weak at opening, but subsequently strength in cash in corn reports of damage from freeze from Southwest, good export demand, and light country offerings caused a price advance that continued until the 25th. On the 25th future wheat prices dropped about 5c due to lack of support despite forecast of freezing temperatures in Southwest, strength in stock market and decrease in visible supplies wheat and corn. Germany and Italy reported seeking new and old wheat crop. Milling demand slow; cash premiums somewhat lower. Visible supply wheat 15,513,000 bushels a decrease of 1,918,000 bushels for week. Visible corn 28,167,000 bushels a decrease of 2,397,000 bushels for week. In Chicago cash market No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.34 1/2, No. 2 \$1.36 1/2, No. 3 mixed corn 68 1/2c, No. 3 yellow 68 1/2c, No. 3 white oats 37c. For the week Chicago May wheat up 1 1/2c at \$1.26, May corn 3c at 89 1/2c. Minneapolis May wheat up 1c at \$1.19; Kansas City May 2c at \$1.17; Winnipeg May 4 1/2c at \$1.60, Minneapolis wheat and flour demand slow.

DAIRY: Butter markets weak and unsettled the past week, price declines averaging 6c. Closing prices, 92 score: New York 40 1/2c, Chicago 40c; Philadelphia and Boston 42c. Approach of fresh season of production given as cause of present weakness. Dealers have been selling freely to avoid being caught with any surplus as signs of usual spring slump have appeared. Cheese markets dull and inactive despite declines averaging fully 1 1/2c. Distributors see no signs of improvement until bottom is reached. Goods moving very slowly; many distributors having difficulty financing operators. Consumptive demand light. The lowest prices of the year were reached on the Plymouth Wisconsin cheese exchange April 25th: Daisies 15c; Double Daisies 14c; Longhorns 13 1/2c; Young Americas 14c. No Twins offered.

COTTON: Spot cotton prices down 11 points the past week, closing at 11.02c per lb. New York May futures lost 14 points at 11.97c.
