DOCTORS WILL MEET

Annual Meeting of State Medical Society in Session at Brooklyn.
Brooklyn, April 25. — Physicians and surgeons from all parts of New York State are looking toward Brooklyn this week, preparing to start there in a few days to attend the annual meeting of the Medical Society of the State of New York next week. This is the first time in more than a century of the society's existence that Brooklyn has been picked out for the annual meeting, and the medical men of that community are preparing a welcome for the visitors that will make the affair one long to be remembered. "Health Week," as it is called, will open next Sunday evening with addresses by the medical men from many cities, speaking from the pulpits of the leading churches of Brooklyn. The annual meeting of the House of Delegates will be held the following day, and at the same time a great public health exhibition will open in the Twenty-Third Regiment Armory. A public meeting is scheduled for Tuesday evening, May 3, and a banquet for Wednesday evening, May 4.
