Of Interest to Farmers

CAN FIND POWER STREAM DEVELOPS

Farmer Should Determine Possibilities Before He Attempts to Harness It For Work—How To Test

If a farmer wishes to develop a stream for water power on his own farm he must first find out how much work the stream will be able to do, according to the department of rural engineering at the State College of Agriculture. The amount of power that a stream may develop depends on the quantity of water and the distance that it falls. The first requirement is any water power development is that these facts should be known.

If the stream flow is comparatively small, a dam may be constructed with a small outlet beneath which several cans of known capacity may be filled. To find the stream flow it is necessary only to know the capacity of the cans and the time it takes to fill them. If the stream is large, this simple plan is not feasible, and a weir must be constructed.

In making this device for stream measurement, the depth and the width of the water flowing thru the rectangular outlet of the weir should be measured. The water pressure is likely to be greater than one expects and even if the stream is only 6 feet wide and 4 inches deep, at least a two-inch plank should be used for the weir.

Must Prevent Leakage
All the water of the stream should go over the weir. Earth should be packed along the upstream side of the board, and the top of the board should be exactly level. It is most important to prevent any leakage around the board itself.

A simple, reliable, device of which may be obtained at the college, will enable one to learn the horse power or the amount of work which may be developed by the stream.

Two types of wheel are used, the turbine wheel and the overshot wheel. In any attempt to develop power it is desirable to have the power plant as near as possible to the place where the power is to be used. It is always better to study and design the power plant in the mid-summer or when the stream is at lowest flow.

EARLY FARM WORK CHECKED BY RAHNS

Favorable weather for farm work and growth of vegetation characterized the first half of the week which ended May 3rd, with temperature above normal and adequate sunshine.

The latter portion of the week, however, was marked by general precipitation and much cooler weather, according to the summary of weather and crop conditions sent out from the Ithaca office of the weather bureau.

Seeding of spring grain and potato planting went forward rapidly until checked by the rains; Dutch early sown grain is up, as well as early potatoes on Long Island. Thick planting is now general except in the northern counties. Winter grains and grasses are doing well, conditions during the week being very favorable for their development. Stock is being turned out to pasture in considerable numbers.

Reports indicate that early apples were more severely injured by the freezes in April than at first supposed.

COSTS \$1.75 TO MAKE ONE GALLON OF SIRUP

Study of Figure Indicates That Average May Be Nearer \$2 — How Costs Were Determined

It costs at least \$1.75 to produce a gallon of maple sirup in New York State, but the average may be nearer \$2, figures compiled at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca indicate. These figures cover the cost of production, and do not include the cost of the value of the maple trees, the value of the sugar, and the value of the labor.

The figures were obtained from a questionnaire answered by 44 different operators who range from 40 to 2,000 bushels, and from incomplete returns obtained by the crop reporter from some 200 orchards.

The items which were considered were interest and depreciation upon the cost of the equipment, the value of all labor, both men and team, the value of fuel used, and some miscellaneous items.

The value of the grove was not taken into consideration for the trees are growing and increasing in volume and value. Furthermore, many woodlots are grazed or they furnish an important revenue as picnic grounds, or for the protection of fields or farmsteads.

It was found that a well-equipped, reasonable efficiently operated sugar bush, and the labor for men or team placed at 35 cents an hour and the stumpage value of wood for fuel at 50 cents a cord would produce sirup at a cost of \$1.75 a gallon.

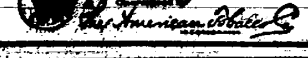
