It was stated that the present low ebb in the market is due to overstocking in 1919-1920 when all dealers bought more lumber than they could readily use.

The assurance that lumber prices would not go lower seems to be gained by the fact that even at the present era of business depression the use of lumber is in excess of its growth in this country and as, the total timber supply is being constantly depleted while the demands for timber are increasing the price naturally would tend to go up.

The possibilities from lumber from the West coming in the eastern markets at a lower price than the timber produced in the East and South was shown to be negligible, because the freight rates on a thousand board feet of lumber from the western coast of New York is greater than the entire cost of lumber produced in-the East and South.

Because of the enormous consumption of wood pulp in news print and the rapid depletion of forest supplies in the East, where ninety percent, of the pulp mills are, it is thot that there would be a steady increase in the price of paper pulp.

443 COWS TESTED

First Week Busy One. Federal Vet

443 diary cattle were tested for tuberculosis during the first week of work. Dr. Robert. Fuller, County, Veterinarian, employed by the Farm Bureau, was assisted by Dr. Cady of the Federal Department this week. With the two men working together an exceptionally large amount of work was accomplished. Testing was done was accomplished. Testing was done for 24 different farmers.

Reacting cattle were found in four
different herds. Mr. John Wells, of
Friendship had eight registered Holsteins showing tuberculosis. Mr. Homer Spencer, of Friendship, also had one. L. E. Talbot of Almond had four and Mr. Fred Karr, of Almond one. At the farm of Sanford & Karr one. At the farm of Sanford & Karr of Almond there were two suspicious anisals. These will be tested in about sixty days. The report showed a very low perqentage of reacting cattle. Including the two suspicious animals we would still have a percentage of only about 3.6 per cent. Applications are coming in quite rapidly at the Farm Bureau office. The Almond Farm Bureau Committee, together with the general dairy interest, has adopted a general tuberculosis eradication project and expects to have all cattle in the vicinity tested in the very near future

HEALTH PROMOTERS

They Are Rich in Growth-Getting Substances Necessary to Life Some Good Recipes

If you don't hanker after a cake as a source of those growth-pro moting substances called vitamines why not have plenty of vegetables and fresh fruit in the dietary and for-

and fresh fruit in the dietary and forget about the yeast?
Tomatoes, spinach, chard, lettuce, cabbage, carrots, turnips, onions, and peas all contain the "water soluble vitamine B" which the scientists talk about, and in which yeast is rich.
The 'vegetables mentioned may be used in many attractive dishes; to give variety they may be used in soups, creamed dishes, scallops, and salads. Here are recipes which the workers at the State College at Ithaca have found good.

have found good.

Cream of spinach soup: 2 quarts
fresh spinach, 1 cup boiling water, 3
cups milk, 4 tablespoons butter, 4
tablespoons flour, salt, pepper.

Pick over the spinach and wash it

Pick. over the spinach and wash it thoroly. Add the boiling water, and cock the spinach until it is tender; then rub it thru a sieve. Make a white sauce of the milk, butter and flour. Add the spinach pulp to the white sauce. Add the seasoning. Keep the soup over hot water until time to serve it. Other greens may be used instead of spinach.

Scalloped carrots with cheese: 1. Loup milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 to 1/3 cup grated cheese, 2 cups cooked sliced carrots, alt, paprika, parsley or 2 tablespoons mineed green pepper.

Make a cheese sauce by melting the butter over hot water and adding the lane.

butter over hot water and adding the flour. When they are well blended add the scalded milk and seasonings. Stir the mixture constantly until it thickens. Add the grated cheese and let the sauce stand over hot water un-til the cheese is melted and the sauce

Arrange the sauce and the sliced carrots in alternate layers in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle buttered crumbs over the top and brown the dish in a moderate over for 25 to 26 minutes.

Tests of this kind are supervised by one or more representatives from the Dairy Division of the College of Agriculture, present at each feeding and milking, to weigh the milk and test it for butter fat content. A duplicate sample of this milk is forwarded to the State College, when careful check is made before the record is reported.
