The caus tic remarks and their evident reluc tic remarks and their evident reluc-tance to pay any attention to the Mullan-Gage laws have angered Gov. Miller. He insists they can enforce the laws if they want to and hurled hot shot at their qualifications as po-

The Governor will undoubtedly bring into action all the machinery at his command to oust any city officstring into action all the machinery at his command to oust any city officials who are lax or recalcitrant in driving bootleggers and saloonkeepers out of business. He said this afternoon he has the power to remove city officials on charges, and is apparently confident there will be no difficulty in having the charges made. It is bolieved he meant the Anti-Saloon Leaguers who are ever ready to swoop down on any unsuspecting official not keeping his domains sufficiently dry.
